How it all began...

The Ronald Wilson Lindemann Athletic Hall of Fame was established and dedicated on October 21, 2000, with the induction of 17 Hastings High School athletes.

The organization was the vision of Bernie O'Brien, class of 1950, as a living tribute to memorialize a man that touched his life and the lives of so many Hastings students during the 40s and 50s — former coach and athletic director Ronald W. Lindemann.

A work in progress for many years, Bernie's aspiration was to create a vehicle to honor former athletes and coaches, and he worked tirelessly and selflessly to do this. This year, his dream, now a reality, continues as we mark our eighth induction ceremony of the Hall of Fame, which has grown to 127 members with the addition of this year's inductees.

Bernie's plan did not end with the Hall of Fame. In fact, it was twofold. He resurrected a failed attempt to establish an alumni association and succeeded in creating the first official Hastings High School Alumni Association. It was formed to give back something to the school he dearly loved by presenting two year-end scholarships to outstanding, graduating athletes and students. Those two scholarships have now blossomed into four scholarships totaling \$10,000. The Association, ever growing and expanding, is currently in the process of creating an alternative level of honor in addition to sports, which will recognize those students who were outstanding in arts, literature, music and the sciences. Hastings High School has the distinct honor of having two Pulitzer Prize winners as graduates.

After many years at the helm, Bernie stepped down as director in 2006 and turned the reigns over to other capable and willing members. As a Hall of Fame member himself, Bernie now enjoys the fruits of his labor. Although he has sidelined himself, Bernie will always be the "go-to man," and his predecessors will continue to build on his dream.

We want to take this opportunity to say "thank you, Bernie" for bringing us all together tonight and for allowing us to be part of your vision and this wonderful organization. When we think of Bernie, we think of the motto he believes in so profoundly...

"A School Without a Past Has No History".



In 1976, the first year that St. Bonaventure gave out scholarships to a woman's team, Kim was chosen as a recipient.

Kim earned her masters degree from College of New Rochelle in Special Education in 1981 and a Certificate in Health Education in 2008.

She has taught physical education and coached varsity, junior varsity and modified levels for over 16 years at private, catholic and public schools. She is presently teaching at Dobbs Ferry HS/MS and coaching modified volleyball, basketball and softball.

While working in recreation at the Andrus Children's Home in Yonkers, Kim met her husband Deryl. They have been married for 26 years and have 5 children – Travis, Kyle, Brad, Luke and Lance. Kim says that "all of the children have followed in their athletic parents footsteps".

After graduation in 1972 and then another summer working at the Butch Chemka Pool, Nancy attended Dean Junior College in Franklin, Mass., as a physical education major. She received her Associate of Science degree in '74 and transferred to Manhattan College in Riverdale, NY. The "all-boys" college had just begun accepting women and two years later she became the first female to graduate with a Bachelor of Science in physical education. While attending Manhattan College, Nancy was inducted into Phi Epsilon Kappa, the physical education Honor Fraternity, and ran in the Penn Relays with the Manhattan College track team.

During college, Nancy worked at the newly opened Bloomingdales store in White Plains, and as a result, that was "the end of her desire to become a physical education teacher." She subsequently left Bloomingdales to work in the office/showroom of a high-end men's tailored clothing company in New York City. She continued working for a number of men's clothing companies before landing her job at Hickey Freeman & Bobby Jones, where she has been for the past 12 years.

Nancy "keeps in touch" with athletics through her job at Hickey Freeman, as they dressed the announcers of the YES network for 2 years. She attends The Masters Tournament every April to help sell the company's Bobby Jones men's & women's apparel for Augusta National Golf Club. She also takes a pilates class two or three times a week and gets lots of exercise walking her golden retriever. She was very active in her church, St. Stanislaus Kostka, until it closed.

Nancy is still living in the house that she grew up in, in Hastings, and states that "now the guy that she had a crush on when she was in 9th grade lives there with her."

Pat Hicks taught physical education at HHS for 22 years. She coached both girls varsity volleyball and girls junior varsity volleyball. Under her direction and guidance, the varsity volleyball squad went undefeated from 1977 to the final game of the 1980 season. In each of those years, winning many league trophies and advancing to sectionals.

In addition to girl's sports, Pat began co-ed volleyball at HHS. This involved several weeks of intense practice after the regular volleyball season commenced and culminated in a huge tournament where many teams competed on one evening at the Westchester County Center or Horace Greenly High School. Under Pat's headship, Hastings High School won this tournament several times and came in 2nd in other years.

Pat retired from teaching in 1984. She lives in Southbury, Connecticut with her cat, Willie. Her days are well spent playing cards and bingo.



MRS. ROSEMARY EATON HHS Physical Education Teacher/Coach: 1967-1987




Rosemary Eaton began her tenure as a physical education teacher in 1967 and was the chairperson of the Physical Education Department. She coached girls varsity basketball and girls varsity track. Her basketball coaching record was stellar and year after year, under her supervision, her teams became league champions and almost always went to sectionals. In 1982, she guided her squad to an incredible record of 20 wins, 2 losses.

In the early 1980's, girls athletics were changing very quickly and Rosemary not only adapted to the times but revolutionized the girls spring track program at HHS. This initiative gave women the chance to compete interscholastically with the same equal opportunities as men. Under her direction, the track program grew and thrived; one year fielding over 60 team members. Her coaching efforts resulted in HHS taking many ribbons and trophies, and setting league records in the 440 relays and 2-mile runs. In fact, due to her and her colleagues' efforts, Hastings High School offered nearly equal opportunity to girls as boys, before the passing of Title IX was even a concept.

Rosemary retired from teaching in 1987 and presently resides in Santa Cruz, California. She enjoys her daughters, Hilary and Bronwyn, both HHS grads, and their families, including her four grandchildren Alexandra, Caroline, Joe and RJ. She has always been an avid jogger, loves tennis and skiing.



JOHN LYSAK - Class of 1937



Shortly after World War I, John Lysak, his brother Stephen, and their two sisters, Anne and Mary, arrived in Hastings-on-Hudson. They were sent to live at The Graham School after their mother died of influenza and their father was unable to care for them. While living at Graham School, John attended Hastings High School.

But it was John's canoeing adventures on the Hudson River as a teenager and his remarkable ability and passion for the sport that would be the beginning of an Olympic dream and extraordinary Olympic memories. On August 22, 1936, in the summer between his junior and senior year at HHS, John, the younger of the two Lysak brothers, sailed for Germany with his teammate to compete in the 1936 Olympic Berlin games. He saw Adolph Hitler, heard the roar of 110,000 spectators, and rubbed shoulders with Jessie Owens. Although John did not medal, he did place 7th in the 10,000 meter, 2-man canoe race.

John remained at The Graham School during his senior year. He graduated from HHS in 1937 and went to Springfield College. When he graduated from Springfield, he returned for a year to Graham and supervised work crews doing painting and other maintenance work. He had hoped to compete again in 1940 Olympics, but those dreams were lost with the outbreak of the war in the Pacific.

John Lysak lives with his two sons, Michael and Keith, in Fremont, CA. He and his sons have 7 boats and have spent much time canoeing, kayaking, sailing and fishing in the bay, the Pacific, and the rivers of northern California.

STEPHEN LYSAK - Class of 1931



Stephen Lysak's love of canoeing and his innate talents with boat design and building techniques catapulted this Hastings High School graduate to a remarkable Olympic victory and a place in sports history.

Stephen and his three siblings grew up on the campus of The Graham School. He attended HHS for 4 years; was vice president of his senior class and excelled in all subjects. After graduation in 1931, he attended Pratt Institute, where he studied cartography, design and drawing.

Even before they were teenagers, Stephen and his brother, John, spent their spare time canoeing on the Hudson River. It was here that Steve honed his extraordinary canoeing ability and dreamed of competing in the 1940 Olympics in Tokyo. However, those games would never be held due to war in the Pacific. He instead joined the Marines and spent the last years of the war on a command ship overseeing the invasion of Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

When the war ended, Stephen returned to Hastings and having never lost sight of his Olympic dream was more determined than ever to compete at the 1948 Olympics in the 1,000 meter and 10,000 meter, paired canoe races. He and his buddy, Steve Mackowski, began an earnest training regimen in the spring of '48 and on June 7th that same year, the pair arrived at Lake Sebago for the two-man 1,000 meter Olympic trials. After scoring an upset victory against the favored, national championship team from Philadelphia, the two "Steves" were chosen to represent the United States at the 14th Olympiad. In a racing canoe, designed and built from scratch by the ingenious Stephen Lysak, the teammates won two medals at the 1948 London games, gold and silver. It was the first Olympic canoe race in history won by the USA.

After their Olympic victory, Stephen Lysak and Steve Mackowski, began a scholastic cance program for high school students. One canceing publication referred to Lysak's greatest pleasure as "helping other people." Stephen continued to paddle well into his 80's and was a member of the Hastings Historical Society. He died on July 31st, 2002, a few weeks short of his 90th birthday. He and his wife Ruth had no children. He once remarked that "the years spent at Graham School and in Hastings were the most formative years of his life."
