HALL OF EXCELLENCE

(Donald Maricle continued) Chemical Engineer and the inventor of the LiSO2 lithium battery. Don, while working for American Cyanamid as a Research Chemist discovered electrochemiluminescence and developed electro-organic synthesis. In other words, Don related how the battery was developed and many interesting aspects which led to the first successful, non chargeable but highly effective lithium battery, with a shelf life of 10 years. This battery is still a favorite today with the military, and has lead to the development of the rechargeable lithium batteries. Needless to say, in a world filled with battery-operated electronics, Don has made a significant contribution to us all.

Another of last year's great honorees, Rear
Admiral Ronald Jesberg introduced his classmate, **G. Michael Howard '53,** and the audience was in for a treat.

Michael emphasized that he was just a regular guy with a somewhat scary title of "Professor Emeritus of Chemical Engineering". When this title is used, he said, "most people get the feeling that Darth Vader was about to enter their space-

ship". "Mike" was a delight, and added a great deal of humor to his acceptance speech. He discussed the education process and his method of teaching. It was obvious he loved his job, and we all wished that, somehow, we had been lucky enough to have been a student in one of his classes.

Dr. Robert H. Hirst, '59, was next to be introduced by Judith Bender, also from the great class of

1959. Dr. Hirst is the General Editor and Curator of the Mark Twain Project and Papers of the University of California at Berkeley.. Since 1949, the Mark Twain Project houses his books, thousands of personal letters, magazine and newspaper pieces, manuscripts and stories.

Judith, in the process of her introduction, quoted Bob Hirst... "If you are bored with

Mark Twain, you either have no sense of humor or you haven't been paying attention". He certainly kept us paying attention with whimsical stories and Mark Twain quotes.

Dr. Hirst's admiration of Twain was obvious throughout his allotted 8 minutes, as he certainly kept us well entertained with his, as well as Mark Twain's humor. Stephen Collins '65 was next introduced by his long standing friend of 60 years, Fred Barnes '65. As Bob Gersky stated... "Everyone knows him," which is only true if you have ever watched TV, gone to the movies, read a newspaper or magazine. Stephen, of course, is a well know acclaimed actor who is also an author, director and musician. Fred discussed Steve's

career which began with an appearance in the Broadway hit, "The Ritz" in 1975. Steve's first movie role was playing "Hugh Slone" in the movie,

"All the President's Men". He discussed Emmy winning roles, and his most famous role as Reverend Eric Camden in the TV series "7th Heaven", which was a record breaking, longest running family drama that ran for 11 years. When Stephen spoke, he discussed his early shyness which prevented him from trying out for the 9th and 10th grade school plays. He did a wonderful job of describing his years growing up in Hastings and praised several of his former teachers. As an example, he said, "actors are often asked about the process of learning all the lines they must memorize". He told the story about Dr. Frank Adams, a teacher a lot of the audience remembered as a tough, chalk throwing math teacher. "Dr. Adams was so thorough that he made sure every one of us was sure of what we already just covered. We would go back to the beginning and then go ahead. Learn a new line, and then go back and review". He added, "I've been doing that for fifty years... Thank you Dr. Adams". Stephen's acceptance speech was filled with warmth and a deep, rich, association with Hastings and his old school.

Ed Caccia '76 introduced the first inductee into the Hall of Excellence from the 1970's, **Staton Rabin** '76, who is an author of children's books and historical novels for teenagers. Ed's excellent presentation and introduction provided us with a great understanding of Staton's great success as an author and successful entrepreneur. She is

the author of numerous books and a winner of many awards for her writing. Perhaps the best known is, "Betsy and the Emperor," which is a good example of what Ed explained as Staton's fascinating technique of creating characters and transposing them into real historical situations and settings. "Betsy" has Al Pacino scheduled to star as Napoleon in the upcoming future movie. Her books help young students gain an appreciation of history while having fun in the process, and understanding history from a child's perspective. Staton thanked several people, among them some of her teachers who had encouraged her in many ways, including making movies. We all could tell we were observing a person who liked to help others by encouragement, teaching, and coaching. Her students are taught to think independently, and to open their minds to endless possibilities. (Continued PG.4)

Earlier, before dinner, Bob Gersky presented the Hall of Excellence awards to Stephen Lysak '31 and John Lysak '36, both of whom represented the United States as participants in the Olympics in canoeing. Both had been previously honored as members of the Athletic Hall of Fame.



John Lysak '37 — John's attraction to canoeing on the Hudson River would lead to his great accomplishment of making the 1936 Olympic team. He didn't medal, but did place 7th in the 10,000 meter, 2-man canoe race. At ninetysix, John is one of the oldest living USA Olympians (he lives in Fremont, CA.)

Stephen Lysak '31 -

After winning a stunning upset in the Olympic trials, Stephen and his personally designed racing canoe went on to capture a Gold and Silver metal at the 1948 Olympics. It was the first Olympic canoe race in history won by the USA. Steve died in 2002.

After a brief summary of events by Bob Gersky, the huge crowd slowly grew silent as the invisible curtain of the Hall of Excellence gradually started closing. The lights grew dim as once more we paused to appreciate all the great achievements that were on display on this very special evening. Sadly, though the curtain on the Hall of Excellence has closed for now, we will meet again in just two years. Until then, keep doing great things and, one day, you will be reading about your own achievements... here, in the HHS Alumni's Great Hall of Excellence.



Richard M. Thomas Music Scholarship:



PETER DELUKE MUSIC SCHOLARSHIP

When Peter DeLuke arrived at HHS as the Supervisor of Music at Hastings High in 1960, he was already a professional musician having played in big bands with legendaries like --Benny Goodman, Jimmy Dorsey, Gene Krupa and Buddy Rich, and performing with celebrities such as Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett, Mel Torme, Rosemary Clooney and queen of scat, Ella Fitzgerald.

Pete had both the capacity to play and teach music as well as the experience of being a professional musician. He passed his passion, love and understanding of music on to his students. Upon retiring from teaching in '85, Pete went back on tour. Presently, he leads a nine piece Duke Ellington Repertory Jazz Orchestra in Southern California; making CD's and performing all over the country.






